
On the final page, we include **fundraising updates** and information about new a summer series of sessions taking place at the **Sir John Soanes museum**.

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Travel

The Wallace Collection, based in Manchester Square, London, invites us back through time to consider travel and navigation, which will perhaps inspire us to make our own journeys, albeit much more locally!

This pocket-sized compass and sundial would have been the perfect accessory for the 18th century traveller. As well as its practical use in navigation and timekeeping, it was a small and stylish status symbol. This object would demonstrate the owner's wealth, education, ability to travel and adventurous spirit.

The marking for north on the compass is also inscribed with a fleur-de-lis, a symbol which is still used on compasses today.



A compass and map are essential tools for navigation. Did you ever use a compass whilst exploring, perhaps as a child or on holiday? What kind of adventures did you have?

Think of a journey that you go on/have been on. It could be the journey to a park or the shops or a journey that was taken as part of a holiday.

- How did/do you travel and what are your favourite landmarks that you pass?
- How long does it take to get there and do you try out different routes?

If you are interested in maps, you could perhaps plot out your journey to see all the roads that you pass through.

Think about the longest single journey you have ever undertaken. What were the most interesting parts of your journey? Did you travel with others or perhaps you relished travelling by yourself?

- Do you have a favourite mode of travel? e.g. foot, bike, train, plane, boat what makes this your favourite way to move?
- How far north or south and east and west have you travelled?
- Have you ever crossed the equator or been to the end of the Metropolitan Line?



Travel writing has long been popular and through the ages there have been various explorers and adventurers noting down their exciting and often perilous journeys to share with others. The Wallace Collection holds this beautiful notebook which was made in France but the cover is Japanese in style.

People were intrigued by countries where life and culture was so different to 18th-century Europe. The art of China and Japan was very fashionable and desirable and there was a flourishing market in imitation East Asian art, called chinoiserie.

The inside of this notebook is lined with silk, and silk folders contain the paper pages. The notebook is clasped shut with a gold pencil. This is not just a notebook, it is an item of beauty and luxury.



The lacquer decoration shows a man standing on the bank of a lake aiming his bow and arrow at a swan that is just flying off. A woman sits beside him, also watching the swan. A second swan is tucked behind a group of flowers and reeds in the lake and is not visible to the couple.

The decoration is very detailed, but the colour palette is restricted to brown-gold, turquoise and pink, and white for the swans. Do you think this scene seems inspired by Japan? What images come into your mind when you think of it?

A notebook can be used to document special holidays, journeys or travel as well as something that keeps safe your innermost thoughts.
